May Meeting Minutes.....

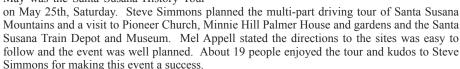

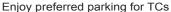

Auxiliary Tail Lamps

One of the first modifications that I did to my MG TC was to install brighter and more visible rear lighting. My two requirements were easy removability and no drilling. I used reproduction '29 Ford Model A tail lamps since I like the style and high-quality reproduction units and stanchions are available through Sacramento Vintage Ford.

I wanted the lamps high enough to be visible to the typical 2 1/2 ton SUV-driving Houstonian. I also wanted the bracket assembly to be as inconspicuous as possible. Since I didn't want to drill any holes, it made sense to build a single bracket and utilize the two bolts which hold the gas tank straps. The bar itself is cold-rolled steel, 1.25" wide by .25" thick purchased from Lowe's. (Fig.1) The overall width of the main bracket is 38". In order to conceal the main bracket, I cut two 2" long pieces from the same bar, radiused the ends, and drilled holes to fit the gas tank bolts. This allows the horizontal main bracket to nest behind the gas tank just above the tank-to-body rubber. Welding these two bars to the main bracket required measuring many times, tack welding, trial fitting, and finally welding solidly. Luckily, I got it right the first time and didn't have to cheat by making oblong holes.

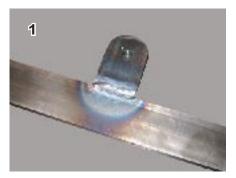
The Model A stanchions needed to be cut down in order to fit the lamps closer to the body and a bit lower for a better appearance. (Fig.2) The final length is approximately 2".

The ends of the horizontal main bracket were trimmed to fit the contour of the cut stanchions. After welding and finishing, the brackets were painted semi-gloss black. (Fig.3)

Wiring was spliced into the original wires running to the D-lamp, and routed between the tank and body to a connector. A matching connector was used on the light bar, and all of it was covered with a vintage-style wiring loom sourced from eBay. (Fig.4) I applied padding to the bar to protect the body paint. The light output is much brighter than stock (especially the all-important brake lamps.)

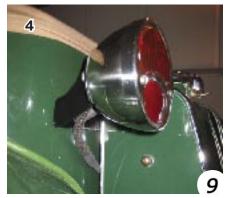
This modification, along with both mechanical and hydraulic brake light switches makes me feel much safer on the road. ●

Tech Topics by Doug Relton

DISTRIBUTOR CONDENSER SURPRISE

A few years ago there was a quality issue with replacement condensers. So I was pleased to have sourced a "lot" of NOS (new old stock) Lucas condensers. I always prefer NOS over replacement items, but they still have to be checked for serviceability. So I had this lot checked and to my surprise nearly all of them failed. Not good!



The condenser is made up of tiny thin layers of foil wrapped in a coil that has a greasy substance integral to the wrapping. On the end of the roll is a contact plate that bridges across the end roll of foil. What I conclude is that the condenser actually has a shelf life. With the passage of time and unknown storage conditions, this NOS item does not have the guaranteed quality of an original. In this case a new replacement is recommended. You may want to check your spares and get a spare.

DISTRIBUTOR UPDATE: Improved Performance

If you have a stock distributor in your T-Series car, chances are that you will have difficulty timing it for peak performance at either idle or cruise RPM. This is due to today's fuel. The solution is to install a distributor that has been rebuilt and had the advance mechanism adjusted for timing at 10 degrees BTDC. This update ensures peak performance throughout the full advance spectrum to high RPM. Replacement distributors are now available on an exchange basis, ready to install. These originals are rebuilt to show quality and include new points, condenser, rotor cap and has even had the gap set for you. Remove, replace, time and you are done. •

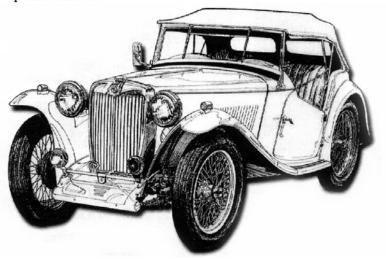
