

## Dave Coleman's Profile



Originally printed in the Jan/ Feb 1990 issue of the Classic Chassis and happy to reprint again here.

Like many of you, I seem to have been born with a love of all things mechanical. Indeed my parents tell me that I could rattle off the names of passing automobiles before being able to name the members of my family. I loved to take things apart to see how they worked and to help fix cars. One notable example, at about four years of age, I inserted the garden hose into the "dirty" exhaust pipe of the Packard our neightbor was working on.

My first exposure to T-Series MG's came, as for many of us, from reading "The Red Car" when I was ten or eleven years old. It must have been subliminal at that point however, as I had no exposure to or knowledge of sports cars. My auto-related activities as a teenager were limited to helping others with their cars and magazine reading. My parents didn't believe that I could have a car and keep up with school work, to say nothing of the expense. As a result, my auto interests were somewhat eclectic, running mainly to hot rods and drag racing.

It wasn't until I was in my third year of college that I first became a car owner. Shortly after relating the story of a near serious bicyle mishap while riding to class, my parents purchased a 1954 Ford convertible for me. I loved that car and polished and massaged it endlessly. About the only thing I hadn't fixed was the canvas top which was old and had a few tears. When a major porton of the top ripped away and blew over the

rail as I was driving across the Golden State Bridge in a downpour, I began to doubt the advisability of having a convertible in San Francisco when one doesn't have a garage. I sold that car not long thereafter. If this sounds like strange reasoning from a developing TC'er, stay tuned.

It was about this time that I had my first TC experience. One of my medical school classmates was getting married and invited several of us to accompany him from San Francisco to the ceremony in Eugene, Oregon. We took two cars, a Ford and his MGTC. Guess who volunteered to ride with him? It was a most memorable trip. It took twelve hours, from noon to midnight, about half in a driving rain and was wonderful. The things I remember: being almost one with a mechanical device (e.g. when the windcreeen wiper motor packed it in. I worked the little crank), the sounds and smells of the car hurrying along the winding roads through the trees, the people waving as we passed. In short, I was hooked. On the trip back, I reluctantly gave up my seat to his new bride and rode back in the Ford, an altogether boring journey.

I wanted a TC, but it was financially out of the question. However, two things happened. I received a small sum of money from a settlement as a result of an accident several years earlier, AND my friend mentioned that he was selling his TC. He needed a family oriented car and anyway the TC wasn't working - he said the clutch had gone out. A deal was struck and I became the proud owner of a non-running MGTC, convinced that this was the perfect car for a med student in San Francisco.

I rented a small garage and armed with an owner's manual, proceeded to take the car apart "to fix the clutch," taking

the transmission out the back way, since I had no way to remove the engine. It was only when I had things torn apart that I discovered the real problem was not the clutch at all, but a broken axle. This was replaced and things were reassembled. By now it was near the end of the term and I packed all my books and belongings in the TC and headed down Highway 1, arriving home on 2-3 cylinders (fouled plugs), low battery, etc. That summer vacation I enjoyed driving my TC, cleaned it up, made a new dash panel and floorboards, and re-wired it - using wire I found in the garage (one yellow, one pink).

Upon returning to San Francisco, I joined the ARR and enjoyed my brief membership. However, after about six months, the realities of having a TC as one's sole transportation in San Francisco set in, and an additional car was purchased. One evening, bored

with studying, the TC's distributor was removed "for cleaning." Since it was early, the fuel pump was next, etc., etc. The car has not run since.

Shortly after this I met Suzie and we later married. Our earliest TC trips were taken in an assorment of vehicles with the TC on a tow bar behind as we moved around and a family was started. We joined the TC Motoring Guild and enjoyed the association, but there never seemed to be any time to start a full resoration project, so we went on tour at the back of the line in our non-English cars. About six years ago, a second TC was purchased when a car restored by Phil Marino became available This has meant that now we can double our enjoyment of club events, i.e., "TC" touring as well as the association with fellow club members.

#### **Dual Purpose Shock Cord**

Last month we showed Richard Loe's shock cord idea for keeping the gearbox from popping out of gear. What is interesting is that the tension is adjusted so it keeps the TC in 2nd and 4th gears but is weak enough not to pull it out of 1st or 3rd. So you don't have to remove it when shifting through the gears.

But you can also loop it around the parking brake lever and keeps the brake on if the lever pawl is worn. So it is a dual purpose cord.


