





### Rebuilding My XPAG

The first part of this series was in the September issue and finally getting to the next step.

Ifinally received a replacement piston ring for the one broke and was able to install the last piston. Moving on I wanted to set up the cam. I installed the adjustable timing gear and checked at least fifty times that there were 15 chain links on the bottom run to the crank gear. I borrowed a degree wheel from Dr. Simmons and made a pointer. It looks a bit like a church key so I've dubbed it the

"Churchill key". First finding true top dead center with a dial gauge and setting the wheel to zero. I lubed



up a tappet, dropped it in the bore and set another upside down atop it for easy reach with the dial gauge. Then I spent the rest of the day pulling my hair out as none of the degrees matched the cam. Starting fresh the next day I found the issue immediately. Lesson learned. When frustrated.....sleep on it.... Each time I'd



turn the engine with a wrench, the plastic degree wheel would slightly slip and throw the degree wheel about 50 degrees out. Which had the number one intake **10** starting to open at about 60 degrees as

opposed to 11. While the dial gauge was out I also checked where the stock pointer was while the engine was at true TDC. It shows just a smidgeon of advance which I'll compensate for when I set the timing.

I have also received my freshly rebuilt oil pump, carburetor bodies and distributor. But decided to replace the driven gear shaft on the pump. While waiting for that, I started assembling the carburetors. I had the bodies re-bushed for the shafts and the bores sleeved as there was so much



warpage you could throw a cat through the gaps when the throttle discs were closed. Since I have the old brass carb to carb linkage that's so pretty, I wanted to retain it and needed the brass lever that connects to the pedal throttle. No US vendor had it, but Burlen in the UK did. This and the front carb idle lever needed to be drilled and pinned to the new shafts. I cut the new shafts by screwing the old ones to them for position. Then drilled and pinned on the levers. While assembling. I realized I'd cut one shaft backwards and had to drill out the roll pin I'd installed to save the part I'd waited a month to come from the UK. Ever tried to drill out a hardened roll pin? Not fun. Thinking I could re use the shaft and just turn it around, I found that the new throttle shafts only allow the disc to be inserted from one direction. The old ones can be used either way....... I just ordered a new shaft......well...there's always next weekend.....

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

Minutes - Secretary Cliff Lemieux reported that the minutes of September 22nd meeting were published in the November "Classic Chassis" newsletter, and requested additions and corrections, if any. None were proposed; the motion was made to approve as written, seconded, and passed by unanimous vote of members present.

Furthermore, weather conditions will most likely be cold. Therefore, it is probable that the party cannot be held – at least not in the traditional way – and not in a restaurant.

Considering what has gone on with the pandemic restrictions, Steve asked members present if we should continue moving forward with the party plans, or cancel the restaurant and come up with an alternative Christmas party. A vote was taken and the consensus was to cancel the



plan to hold the party at the restaurant. Mike Simmons indicated that there are ways to get together on-line as an alternative. By unanimous vote – without objection – the Christmas party to be held at the Tam O'Shanter restaurant will be cancelled.


