



MGB Seven Blade Fan for the TC

I have good intentions for keeping my MG TC stock, but will make exceptions if they make sense or something that I really want to do.

TC 1733 has been over heating, mainly due to rusted water passages from sitting in storage far too long, I think. I cleaned out a lot of the rust, ran a solution through it, flushed out the engine several times, and flushed out the radiator. All of these helped a lot, but the Moss 7 blade fan looked like a good idea. My idea was to get it, bolt it on, and if it didn't work out well, put my old fan back on.



However, the vellow fan will never look good in the engine compartment. I had my black paint ready before the fan arrived. When it arrived, I found out that just bolting it on was not how it works. The instructions supplied tell you that you need to re-tap the threads on the pully to match the Allen screws supplied. You will need an M5X0.80 tap (not supplied) to rethread the M5X0.75 existing threads in the pulley. This means you are about to go past the point of no return with this. You will also need a #4 Allen wrench (not supplied, but a common size), and an 11mm wrench for the bolts supplied.

With my old blades off, I rethreaded the pulley with my new Tap from Amazon. Easily done, but not a lot of room to work with. I test fitted the new blade and adapter without screws, and the clearance looked OK. However, with the Allen screws in the adapter and the fan bolted to the adapter, there wasn't enough room to put it in place. The Allen screws stuck out too much to get the assembly in place. If you bolt on the adapter first, there isn't enough clearance to fit the blade on it.

I didn't want to pull the radiator for this unless I absolutely had too. The 4 holes in the blade allow for an Allen wrench to go through them. But are smaller than the Allen head screw head. I drilled these out with a 5/16" drill bit, and the screws would go back further. This would allow them to go inwards enough to fit the assembly in place.

Yes, it worked, but there is still very little room to get the screws to thread into place. The Allen thread will fit in,

All right. I gave in and pulled the radiator and installed it and radiator anyway. Maybe with more patience and time, it might have worked without pulling the radiator,

So.... my advice is to plan on pulling the radiator if you want to install this fan! I haven't run the engine yet, so I don't know how much it will help at this time. I need Georgia to help me



get the bonnet back on before I can drive it much. I hope to have a report later on with the results.




