

TC 7499 is slowly being fitted together. However this is an initial fitting and all will be disassembled again to paint.

Note the bumpers as 7499 is actually an EXU model. But some of the brackets are misaligned so needs more work.



100 years of MG - But When?



Printed for the University Newspapers, Ltd., by THE HOLYWELL PRESS, Ltd., Oxford, and published at 9 Alfred Street, High Street, Oxford. November 28th, 1923.

There has been a lot of talk lately on the MG 100th anniversary. But when is the date or year of the 100th? Here are some events that are significant. Cecil Kimber came to Morris Garages in 1921 and started modifying Morris Cowley cars in 1923. MG designation was also introduced at that time. The ad above seems to be the first use of the MG octagon logo, but cars were still a sideline of Morris. In 1925 Old Number One was built, and used the round badge. 1927 was when the octagon badge went on the cars and in 1928, the sideline had become large enough to

warrant an identity separate from the original Morris Garages. But it wasn't until July1930 when a separate M.G. Car Company Limited was incorporated.

No wonder TCs are known to wander about on the road when the history is so loose.

It appears MG Car Club has officially decided to celebrate the 100th anniversary as 1923-2023.

Run vs Own

There is nothing more interesting than finding out what other cars someone owns. It tells a lot about their diversity of interests or compulsive nature for having only a few exquisite marques. Often in these discussions, or subtly listed as their signature at the end of an internet thread, the number of vehicles owned presents itself.

To further refine this measure, I also suggest that the nomenclature – RWP – also be used to describe those vehicles that Ran When Parked, with the additional provision that they have not been substantially

disassembled, as it should be obvious that everything we own ran at one time before it was parked. So, each of those RWP vehicles count as one half when figuring the ratio, but RWP must be included after each vehicle in such a listing.

In perspective, my list of 22 vehicles (initially impressive, one would think) would yield a ratio of 13/22 or .59, which clearly indicates that I need to either liquidate, or get my butt in gear and get more of these back 'on the road'. Interested parties for the projects, please inquire within!

TCMG / ARR Annual Conclave


Cambria & Hearst Castle October 8-10


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
