I have two MG's. The TC and an MGA. Luckily the MGA came with enough documents that I was able to trace it back to its original owner. I know every one except from about 1995-2000. This person did the rust repair and a repaint. I had the name and address of the owner who bought the car in 1979. I wrote a letter and a few months later got a call from him. He intended to restore the car, but it just sat in his sons garage until he sold it off in about 1995, but didn't remember to who. The paperwork picked up again about 2000. 





# History of TC 3400

Tom Howes has TC 3400 now but is trying to find some documentation on its history. He writes:

Sounds silly, but I think I potentially own Phil Hill's first MGTC. If so the car will deserve a better life than what I can give it, but I am having a difficult time proving/or disproving the provenance and need help.

My Uncle gave the TC to me for Christmas 5 years ago, he told me it was possibly Phil Hill's MG. I didn't think much of the comment. When my Uncle died 2 years ago I went to Southern California to pick up his Lotus and met the son of the man (also deceased) who sold the MG to my uncle, and the son made the same comment about the car being Phil Hill's. When I got home, I did a google search (blessing or curse, not sure) and have learned a lot about the car, but not enough to prove or disprove that it is or isn't Phil Hill's first MG. Nothing I have learned makes me think it's not, but nothing concrete.

My first search brought up results and descriptions of a Gooding and Company auction from 2021 auction "The Phil Hill Automobilia Collection/A Life in Racing". In Lot 13, is a letter from Mark Jones to Mr. Hill stating that he owned Phil's first TC and hoped for additional history about the car. The letter (below) gives the serial number as 34 The last two numbers are covered. I reached out to Gooding and

Company. They stated that they didn't keep a copy of any of the materials auctioned off. Stated they would have to reach out to successful bidder. My last few e-mails have gone unanswered.




Various people have volunteered their time, but end up the same place I have. Nothing concrete. Based on Phil Hill's life, and the ties to his first MGTC, I think I need to carry out the search. Any help would certainly be appreciated.

#### NOTES

- -We have also reached out to Derek Hill, to no avail.
- -California DMV said their records don't go back that far.
- -The owners instruction book has "Jones" printed on the inside cover, and assume its Mark Jones from the letter.
- -3400 rolled off assembly line August 25th, 1947, Phil Hill stated that he got his at International Motors (L.A.) in November 1947
- -The MG Car Club published an interview with Phil Hill (from 1960) in their December 2020 news letter where Phil talks about his first two MGTCs. but no numbers mentioned

Tom's note was posted on the TABC list but nobody has been able to help there yet.




